Neighbor to Neighbor

Dear Friends and Neighbors,

With summer winding down, fall promises to be a busy season in the Village. Construction on Archer Avenue is underway and will continue until early next summer. While inconvenient, the Archer widening improvement is something the Village has worked diligently with the State for the past dozen years.

When completed there will be full turn lanes in three of the four directions at Archer and Willow Springs Road. (Flavin Road south will remain unchanged due to the Forest Preserve's decision to maintain the existing conditions). However, the entrances to both Market Street and Old Willow Shopping Center will be aligned to create a more uniform look and facilitate the flow of traffic between sites. A shared use sidewalk/bike path will be installed on either side of Archer, aiding pedestrian and bike traffic. Traffic signals will be updated to allow emergency vehicles quicker and safer access through the intersection.

The Village continues to strengthen our infrastructure with its annual street maintenance program, which includes a half-dozen repaving and repair projects on local streets. Road repairs are self-funded through an earmarked local sales tax fund, which strictly directs dollars for such purposes. This means local streets are maintained with no additional burden or borrowing. This fiscally sound spending practice helps the Village maintain its bond rating through a challenging economy.

In addition, the Village continues to work with the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District to implement floodway and erosion controls. While blessed with an abundance of nature and waterways, increasingly frequent extreme rainfalls pose a considerable challenge in mitigating the effect of these events.

This year, the MWRD has committed to drainage and erosion control projects along the Cal-Sag Tributary along Poston Road, and the Ravine Watershed which follows a path from the Forest Preserves down into the Cal-Sag. We continue to work to gain additional relief projects along Flagg Creek.

Strengthening infrastructure and sound financial practices have paid off in maintaining property values in the Village. A recent survey of Cook and Will counties published last month in the Chicago Tribune evaluated median property sales from 2012 to 2013. The median price of 30 sales in Willow Springs rose from \$166,000 to \$222,000.

Thank you again to all who attended, participated in, and most importantly – volunteered their time—to make the 7th annual Benefit Car Show a tremendous success. The Village continues to donate proceeds to Veterans and needy families.

Please enjoy this most scenic time of year in the Village and I hope to see you at the next “Coffee with the Mayor” on September 20 at 10 a.m. at the Village Hall.

HELP FIGHT WEST NILE

Mosquitoes carrying the West Nile Virus primarily come from standing water around your home. It doesn't take much water for mosquitoes to develop. You can take the following simple steps to eliminate potential sources:



- ✓ Throw away all trash that can hold water (cans, jars, bottles, etc.)
- ✓ Clean rain gutters and downspouts to prevent water from standing in gutters or on flat roofs
- ✓ Change water in bird baths, wading pools, etc. at least once a week.
- ✓ Maintain swimming pools properly
- ✓ Keep ditches and streams on or around property free of grass clippings, garbage, and other debris to insure proper flow
- ✓ Stack pails, barrels, tubs, wheelbarrows, and similar containers upside down
- ✓ Clean out and fill tree holes
- ✓ Stock ornamental ponds with goldfish or other surface-feeding fish
- ✓ Dispose of used tires properly

Friendly Reminders from **PUBLIC WORKS**

Branch Pick Up

Village Ordinance provides for Branch Pickup resulting from basic maintenance, or Pruning of bushes and trees. The Village **Does Not Remove** Full or Partially Removed Trees from private property. You must hire a contractor to take these branches from your property. Branches from Pruning may be a Maximum of 3 inches thick and no longer than 6 Feet long. By Ordinance, Public Works cannot chip any long than 10 minutes Maximum per residence to remove pruned branches. The intent is to allow enough time so all residences can enjoy this service. Please be courteous and mindful of your neighbors when placing amounts of branches at your curbside.

NOTE: Branch Pick Up ENDS with the start of Fall. At that time, all remaining branches must be disposed through Groot Recycling in the brown waste bags with a lawn waste sticker. The stickers can be purchased at the Village Hall for \$2.70. Please store larger branches inside your yard so they may be chipped in the Spring.

Leafing



Leaf Pick Up will then begin. Unlike branch pick up, there is no set schedule of days for leaf pick up. Trucks will be dispatched to areas of the village as necessary. Please place your leaf piles at the easement. **Please remember:** Yard waste and leaves cannot be mixed. Leaf piles containing yard waste will not be picked up. Grass, leaves and snow are not permitted in the street.

Snow Removal

Public Works cannot be called to clear off private property and driveways. Please be courteous to your neighbors and motorists. Do not shovel snow back into the streets.



“Working Smoke Alarms Save Lives: Test Yours Every Month” is the theme of this year’s Fire Prevention Week.

Safety Tips

- Stay in the kitchen when you are frying, grilling, broiling, or boiling food.
- If you must leave the room, even for a short period of time, turn off the stove.
- When you are simmering, baking, or roasting food, check it regularly, stay in the home, and use a timer to remind you.
- If you have young children, use the stove’s back burners whenever possible. Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the stove.
- When you cook, wear clothing with tight-fitting sleeves.
- Keep potholders, oven mitts, wooden utensils, paper and plastic bags, towels, and anything else that can burn, away from your stovetop.
- Clean up food and grease from burners and stovetops.

Cooking

- U.S. Fire Departments responded to an estimated annual average of 156,600 cooking-related fires between 2007-2011, resulting in 400 civilian deaths, 5,080 civilian injuries and \$853 million in direct damage.
- Two of every five home fires start in the kitchen.
- Unattended cooking was a factor in 34% of reported home cooking fires.
- Two-thirds of home cooking fires started with ignition of food or other cooking materials.
- Children under five face a higher risk of non-fire burns associated with cooking than being burned in a cooking fire.
- Microwave ovens are one of the leading home products associated with scald burn injuries not related to fires. Nearly half (44%) of the microwave oven injuries seen at emergency rooms in 2011 were scald burns.

Flu Season is Almost Here!

Every flu season is different, and influenza infection can affect people differently. Even healthy people can get very sick from the flu and spread it to others. The “seasonal flu season” in the United States can begin as early as October and last as late as May. During this time, flu viruses are circulating in the population. An annual seasonal flu vaccine (either the flu shot or the nasal-spray flu vaccine) is the best way to reduce the chances that you will get seasonal flu and lessen the chance that you will spread it to others. When more people get vaccinated against the flu, less flu can spread through that community. It takes about two weeks after vaccination for antibodies to develop in the body and provide protection against the flu. The vaccine is for everyone who is at least 6 months of age and it’s especially important for some people to get vaccinated. Those people include the following:

- 
- People who are at high risk of developing serious complications like pneumonia if they get sick with the flu. This includes:
 - People who have certain medical conditions including asthma, diabetes, and chronic lung disease.
 - Pregnant women.
 - People 65 years and older
 - People who live with or care for others who are high risk of developing serious complications. This includes:
 - Household contacts and caregivers of people with certain medical conditions including asthma, diabetes, and chronic lung disease.

Different side effects can be associated with the flu shot and LAIV.

The flu shot: The viruses in the flu shot are killed (inactivated), so you cannot get the flu from a flu shot. Some minor side effects that could occur are:


- Soreness, redness, or swelling where the shot was given
- Fever (low grade)
- Aches

If these problems occur, they begin soon after the shot and usually last 1 to 2 days. Almost all people who receive influenza vaccine have no serious problems from it. However, on rare occasions, flu vaccination can cause serious problems, such as severe allergic reactions.



COUNTDOWN TO THANKSGIVING: BUYING THE HOLIDAY TURKEY

What would Thanksgiving be without the turkey? Most of us plan our entire holiday dinner around the turkey. That's a lot of pressure on one bird! Here's what you need to know when you go to the store to buy your holiday turkey.



CHOOSING YOUR TURKEY

- **Fresh or frozen?** Buy a frozen turkey if you want to buy it well in advance of your meal, keep it frozen until you're ready to thaw it. Turkeys can be kept frozen in the freezer indefinitely; however, cook within 1 year for best quality. Remember to allow time for thawing. Once thawed it is safe for two more days. Buy a fresh turkey no more than two days before cooking.
- **Size?** When selecting your turkey, allow 1 pound of turkey per person for fresh or frozen, 1¼ pound per person for frozen pre-stuffed.
- **Hen or tom?** Don't worry about it! The designation of "hen" (female) or "tom" (male) turkey is optional on the label and is an indication of size. Toms are larger but both toms and hens should be equally tender. Turkeys of either sex that are less than 8 months of age are considered "young" turkeys.
- **Do not buy fresh pre-stuffed turkeys.** If not handled properly, any harmful bacteria that may be in the stuffing can multiply very quickly.


AT THE STORE

- **Select cold food last.** Pick up the turkey and other perishable food items at the end of your shopping trip to ensure that they stay refrigerated until right before checkout.
- **Read the label.** Don't buy food that is past the "Sell-by," "Use-By," or other expiration dates
- **Check the packaging.** Never choose a turkey with packaging that is torn or leaking. Make sure frozen food is frozen solid and refrigerated food feels cold.
- **Separate foods in your grocery cart.** Keep raw meat, like a turkey, away from other food to prevent the possibility of cross-contamination. Keep them separated during checkout and in your grocery bags, too.

AT HOME

When you arrive home after shopping for your holiday meal, you will probably have lots of bags to unload. Be sure to unload all of your groceries right away. This time of year, the USDA Meat and Poultry Hotline gets a lot of questions about whether a turkey left in the trunk of the car overnight is safe (it's not!). As always, as soon as you get the groceries inside, refrigerate or freeze all perishables – including the turkey.

Safety Tips for Winter Weather



Winter storm tips for home

- ❖ Make sure your Emergency Kit is stocked and winter storm ready.
- ❖ Use sand to improve traction and apply products that melt ice on walkways.
- ❖ Make sure you have sufficient heating fuel. Regular fuel sources may be cut off.
- ❖ Keep emergency heating equipment and fuel so you can keep at least one room of your house warm enough to be livable.
- ❖ Keep fire extinguishers on hand, and make sure your family knows how to use them.
- ❖ Winterize your home to extend the life of your fuel supply. Insulate walls, attics, doors, and windows.
- ❖ Install storm windows or cover windows with plastic.
- ❖ Do not overexert yourself or work outside for extended periods of time.

Winter storm tips for traveling



- ❖ Make sure your car is in good operating condition before using it in extreme cold.
- ❖ Keep condensation (water) out of your gas tank by keeping the tank as full as possible.
- ❖ Maintain a storm kit in your car with such items as a cell phone and charger; blankets; extra clothing; jumper cables; a flashlight; extra batteries; high-calorie, non-perishable food; and matches or a lighter.
- ❖ Plan your trip carefully. If cold, snowy, or icy conditions exceed your ability or your car's ability, don't travel. If you must travel, be cautious.
- ❖ Tell someone about your travel plans.
- ❖ Never leave the motor running in a vehicle parked in an enclosed or partially enclosed space, such as a garage.

NO PARKING ON THE STREETS AFTER TWO INCHES OF SNOW

Ordinance 3-O-2008 and Title 11, Chapter 5D, Section 2(B) of Village Code:
"Snow Removal: It shall be unlawful to park any vehicle on any public street in the Village at any time within twelve (12) hours after a snowfall of two inches (2") or more has occurred."
