- Road improvements have begun throughout town and should be completed in early October.


These are just a few of the happenings this past summer, many of which are covered in more detail throughout this newsletter.

NEW AMBULANCE IN SERVICE AT THE WILLOW SPRINGS FIRE STATION 124

Medic 124 was placed in service at the Willow Springs Fire Station in June 2019. Medic 124 is a Wheeled Coach Advanced Life Support Ambulance. The Willow Springs Station houses an ALS Fire Engine, an ALS Ambulance, an All Terrain Vehicle, a Rescue Boat, a Utility Vehicle and the Fire Prevention Bureau. The Fire District employs sixty Firefighters and five Chief Officers along with ten civilian support staff, all ready to help you at a moments notice.

POLICE DEPARTMENT



The Village of Willow Springs is pleased to announce the appointment of Willow Springs Police Sergeant Michael Giorgetti as the new Deputy Chief of Police.

Deputy Chief Giorgetti has been employed with the Willow Springs Police Department serving the Village and its residents for over 29 years. He has extensive training and certifications in various aspects of law enforcement and investigations, as well as an Associate in Arts Degree and an Associate in Applied Science from Moraine Valley Community College, a Bachelor of Arts degree in Criminal Justice Administration from Lewis University, and a Master's Degree in Business Management with an Emphasis in Organizational Development through Benedictine University.

Giorgetti has served in a supervisory role as a Sergeant of the Willow Springs Police Department for several years and has been detailed out to the United States Department of Justice Drug Enforcement Administra-

tion Enforcement Group 37 and Tactical Diversion Group 81 for over a decade. He has brought more than two and a half million dollars to the village in the form of seizures and written successful grants that totaled over eight hundred thousand dollars for the village. He is currently second in command and assists in running the day to day operations of the Willow Springs Police Department.





Officers Justin Haubenreiser and Louis Stillo received a departmental commendation from the Willow Springs Police department for their heroic efforts in performing lifesaving measures (AED application and CPR) to a unresponsive driver prior to the arrival of paramedics. Officer Stillo was also promoted to full time police duty.

Congratulations also to Matthew Engel who recently graduated from the Macon County Law Enforcement Training Center and was appointed to full-time police duty.

Village of Willow Springs Refuse, Recycling, Yard Waste Collection Program

HERE'S HOW IT WORKS

- **COLLECTION SERVICE:** On collection day refuse and recycling carts are to be set out by no later than 6 AM at a location that is visible and readily accessible to collection workers.
- DAYS OF COLLECTION: Monday South of Des Plaines River Tuesday North of Des Plaines River
- REFUSE & RECYCLING CART INFORMATION: Single family homes will receive a new waste and recycling cart. The standard size cart to be distributed to each single family home will be a 96 gallon waste cart and a 64 gallon recycling cart. Roy Strom has completed a review of each single family residential location and will provide the same size cart as the previously provided carts. Please contact Roy Strom if you would like to confirm your size cart.
- REFUSE & RECYCLING COLLECTION INFORMATION: Residents may set out unlimited household waste and unlimited household recycling each week on collection day. Residents are required to utilize the carts provided. Residents may also use their own containers no greater than 35 gallons and are not to exceed 45 pounds. If a resident would like to rent an additional waste or recycling cart please contact Roy Strom.
- **RECYCLABLES** may be placed in the provided recycling cart (commingled). Review the top of your recycling cart lid for a full list of accepted and unaccepted recyclable material or visit roystrom.com
- YARD WASTE COLLECTION SERVICE: Residents may set out yard waste (grass, leaves, shrubbery cuttings, brush material, branches, etc.) at the curb in **brown yard waste paper bags** designed for the collection of yard waste material. No personal containers allowed. Each bag is not to exceed 32 gallons in capacity or 50 pounds in weight. Branches/ brush may be set out in bundles. Individual branches are not to exceed 4 ft. in length or 4" in diameter and each bundle is not to exceed 50 pounds.
 - Prepaid Village of Willow Springs Yard Waste Sticker must be affixed to each bag or bundle set out.
 - Yard Waste must be set out for collection no later than 6AM on your collection day
 - Yard Waste Collection runs April 1 December 31
 - Yard Waste Stickers are available for purchase at Village Hall
 - Holiday Greenery (Christmas trees, wreaths, etc.) will be collected the first two weeks of January
- YARD WASTE CART RENTAL: Residents may choose to subscribe to weekly collection utilizing a 96 gallon yard waste cart.

 Please visit roystrom.com and complete the form under the Willow Springs section of the website. Any yard waste outside the cart must have a yard waste sticker.
- **BULK ITEM COLLECTION:** Residents may set out one bulk item per week for collection. Items included in the collection program include furniture and household goods. Carpeting set out may not weigh more than 45 pounds; no greater than 4 feet in length and 2 feet in diameter and limited to four rolls per week. Home remodeling and home repair is also limited to 45 pounds per container and four containers per week.
- OVERSIZED ITEM / OVERWEIGHT ITEM / APPLIANCES: Items that require two or more people to lift will require a special pick up. Items include washer, dryer, sleeper sofa, refrigerator, piano, hot tub, etc. To schedule a special pick up please contact Roy Strom.
- ELECTRONIC WASTE COLLECTION: Residents in need of electronic waste collection must contact Roy Strom to schedule a curbside pickup. Roy Strom will record your name and address and will contact you four days prior to the scheduled collection of you electronic waste collection. Collection is only available for e-waste generated by Village residents. This program is done at no extra cost to the resident. Effective December 1, 2019 Willow Springs Public Works drop off will no longer be accepting electronic items.
- HOLIDAY COLLECTION SCHEDULE: New Year's Day, Labor Day, Memorial Day, Thanksgiving Day, Independence Day, Christmas Day will be observed and will not have collection on these days. If the holiday falls on a Sunday, Monday, or Tuesday, collection will be delayed one day.

Water and Garbage News

The Village has elected to change waste service providers effective December 1, 2019. Roy Strom Refuse Removal Service, Inc. was selected as the new hauler. Roy Strom is a local family owned waste hauler that has been providing collection services in the Chicago area since 1944. While the majority of services will remain the same, Roy Strom offers a new electronic waste collection service. This new service will allow you to schedule a limited number of free curbside electronics pick ups as well.

Roy Strom is working to take a garbage tote inventory of the sizes that each resident has at their home. If you would like to change the size of your container, please contact Roy Strom prior to Monday, September 30th. Roy Strom will deliver new totes to your home on the last collection day in November (November 25 on the south side and November 26 on the north side). Upon delivery of your garbage totes, Roy Strom will include an informational pamphlet that will provide you with information regarding the new service.

The West Suburban Water Commission would like to thank our former Executive Director Jerry Strazzante for his years of service and wish him well on his retirement. The position has been filled by Colleen Kelly. Colleen has been with the West Suburban Water Commission for over 20 years and the Commission has confidence that she will fulfill the position and will make great strides to bring the water Commission up to date on the newest and safest technology available for our residents.

The water main project is almost complete. Over 3100 feet of water main was replaced and now in service. We are at the final stages of completing landscaping restoration and replacing the streets. We want to thank all of our residents that were within our project for their patience and understanding.

The Water Commission has begun the process of installing "smart" water meters. These water meters have the potential of storing 30 days of data and sending alarms for leaks etc. We are installing the meters in sections of town and are at no cost to you! When you receive a letter please call to schedule an appointment.

PUBLIC WORKS

Thank you to our residents for maintaining your lawns and adding to the beauty of our community. Everything grew tremendously due to tropical summer weather conditions—keeping our landscaping crew working very hard.

On the topic of weather, heavy rains caused some flooded areas. Public Works and Village Administrators are working on solutions to tackle problem areas and have added new sewers, replaced culverts and added drain ditches to help. We would like to stress that no matter how nice you want your lawn to look, please don't blow grass clippings onto the street or clog the storm sewers with leaves, twigs, glass clippings. If you use a landscaping service, please tell them as well. Prevention is key!

Maintenance work was done late summer on all the sanitation pumping stations to provide extra pumping power. Willow Springs Public Works constantly monitors the stations and performs regular maintenance checks. Please refrain from flushing "flushable wipes" - while they do flush down a toilet- they do not dissolve like toilet paper.

We hope that everyone enjoyed our local parks, and the improvements (installing a ramp at Healing Waters to aid in resident accessibility and adding new LED lights to Lions Park) are helpful for our residents. The splash pad has closed for the season and will reopen next Memorial Day (weather permitting).

The Fall Resurfacing Road Project is underway on both the North (Dunbar, Doogan, 86th St and Rainford) and South (Elm, Pine, Walnut, Pearl, Charleton and Oakwood Ave) sides of town. Our public works crew can fix small holes or rough areas that crop up, so please contact public works at 708-839-3027 to report problem areas. We thank you for your patience during this project and want to remind everyone to be cautious and slow down when you see the road maintenance and work vehicles, as well as our Public Works vehicles. A small inconvenience will prevent accidents and let our workers safely do their job to improve the Village!

Our public works crew is in the process of winterizing our vehicles and equipment. This is a top priority now as we get ready to face another Chicagoland winter. We have added a new plow and salt truck to our fleet, and ordered salt for the winter months ahead.




Branch pick up will continue through October 14. After this time, weather permitting and dependent upon equipment availability you may be able to schedule a pick up as needed by contacting the Public Works department. Fall leaf collection begins October 28 and continues every week until the first major snowfall. Please pile leaves on <u>your easement</u> by 7 am on Mondays to ensure pick up during our weekly pick up.

Not to jump ahead too far, but we would like to remind you that when the snow comes, parking on village streets is prohibited when snow levels reach 2 inches or more. Please do not shovel snow into the street (this is illegal) and be cautious around snow plows, salt trucks, emergency vehicles and school buses. Salting and plowing will be completed first on through streets, followed by side-streets, cul-de-sacs and alleys, and then public parking lots and sidewalks. Public works does not clear private property or driveways.

CENTENNIAL TRAIL BRIDGE OPEN!

The new bridge across the Des Plaines River leading to the Centennial Trail is open! Illinois' Centennial Trail runs through parts of three suburban counties from Willow Springs Road to Romeo Road/135th Street southwest of Chicago. The trail occupies a thin strip of land between the Des Plaines River and the Chicago Sanitary and Ship Canal, and features a historic swing bridge. Coursing primarily through forest, the trail is ideal for bird and wildlife watching. Fall is the perfect time to ride or walk the Centennial Trail. We hope that residents can take advantage of this great resource so close to home.

Centennial Trail Facts:

- · Runs through tree counties—Cook, Will and DuPage
- · Length is 13 miles
- · Trail end points: Willow Springs Rd. in Willow Springs and E. Romeo Rd. at Isle a la Cache Forest Preserve in Romeoville
- · Trail surface: Asphalt
- · Trail activities: Bike, in-line skating, wheel chair accessible, walking

Several dozen citizens came out for our annual remembrance ceremony. Thanks to local Boy Scout Troops 69, 216 and Pack 69 that assisted with the flag retreat and presentation. The Village of Willow Springs will never forget!





The weekend of September 6 – 8 was the 28th River Thru History Rendezvous, an event that has been going on at Columbia Woods for more than 30 years. This event is a living history reenactment of early American life, as it was on the Illinois frontier in this area along the Des Plaines River prior to 1848. It is a festive gathering of fur trappers, settlers, craftsmen, and entertainers.

This year's event had 38 encampments making it one of the larger years for rendezvous participants, with activities like archery, tomahawk throw and paddling a voyager canoe. Visitors also got to enjoy their favorite kettle corn, fry bread and root beer while trading for "pelts" at the trading post.

900 children came through on Friday for school days, a free field trip offered to 4th and 5th graders. This experience allows students to be immersed in a rich discussion of history, social customs, and the skills necessary to survive on the frontier. Despite rain until noon on Sunday, 1350 folks came through the event for the weekend.

We are selling this pictorial collection to raise funds to purchase informational signs to be placed by "The Worker" statue near the southwest corner of Archer Avenue and Willow Springs Road. The statue is located close to where a Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) camp once stood in the early 1930s.

The statue was originally constructed to honor the young men of the CCC who contributed greatly to the development and preservation of our natural resources and forests, including construction of shelters, bridges and walking paths.
